The First Lesson – Acts 11:1-18

Now the apostles and the believers who were in Judea heard that the Gentiles had also accepted the word of God. So when Peter went up to Jerusalem, the circumcised believers criticized him, saying, "Why did you go to uncircumcised men and eat with them?" Then Peter began to explain it to them, step by step, saying, "I was in the city of Joppa praying, and in a trance I saw a vision. There was something like a large sheet coming down from heaven, being lowered by its four corners; and it came close to me. As I looked at it closely I saw four-footed animals, beasts

of prey, reptiles, and birds of the air. I also heard a voice saying to me, 'Get up, Peter; kill and eat.' But I replied, 'By no means, Lord; for nothing profane or unclean has ever entered my mouth.' But a second time the voice answered from heaven, 'What God has made clean, you must not call profane.' This happened three times; then everything was pulled up again to heaven. At that very moment three men, sent to me from Caesarea, arrived at the house where we were. The Spirit told me to go with them and not to make a distinction between them and us. These six brothers also accompanied me, and we entered the man's house. He told us how he had seen the angel standing in his house and saying, 'Send to Joppa and bring Simon, who is called Peter; he will give you a message by which you and your entire household will be saved.' And as I began to speak, the Holy Spirit fell upon them just as it had upon us at the beginning. And I remembered the word of the Lord, how he had said, 'John baptized with water, but you will be baptized with the Holy Spirit.' If then God gave them the same gift that he gave us when we believed in the Lord Jesus Christ, who was I that I could hinder God?" When they heard this, they were silenced. And they praised God, saying, "Then God has given even to the Gentiles the repentance that leads to life."

The official band of the St. Andrew's Society of New York State and a fixture at their events, the band has performed for many years at the Scottish American Society Ball. "THE KIRKIN' O' THE TARTANS"

The Scottish Heritage Service is a worship service of traditional content for all people, but with special significance for Scots. Central to its theme is the "Kirkin' o' the Tartans", a presentation of the Tartans of the Scottish Clans, symbolizing rededication of the families of all nationalities everywhere to God's service. It is further characterized by the beauty of Scottish music, the color and dignity of its presentation, and the close bond of fellowship sensed by all who attend.

Tartan symbolism is akin to that of flags, its distinctive, cross-lines patterns representing specific Scottish clans, regions and regiments. In 1745, with Scots divided over monarchial matters, those following "Bonnie Prince Charlie" were defeated in the Battle of Culloden. Harsh repression of Scottish militancy and national identity followed, including the outlawing of tartan garments, a shocking condition that continued nearly forty years. With the triumph of righteousness over fear, the repressive laws were abandoned and the tartan restored as lawful garb. In the present century, the tartan, identifying the wearer with his or her clan, region or Scottish regiment, is recognized worldwide as a symbol of Scotland.

The Banner carried this morning is a representation of the flag of Scotland, featuring a white saltire on a blue field, an x-shaped cross of St. Andrew, patron saint of Scotland. Three Scottish thistles represent the Trinity. The Banner was designed and created by Brooke Manning-Hinds, Valerie Erichs, and Ruth Witt, in honor of Philip L.R. Du Val, leader of Scottish Heritage Sunday and presented to the church in 2008, at the 35th Anniversary of Scottish Heritage Sunday.

TODAY IN WORSHIP

Welcome to worship on this fifth Sunday of Eastertide as our congregation is celebrating Scottish Heritage Sunday. We are glad you are worshipping with us and pray you will experience the grace of God's welcome and be spiritually refreshed and socially reoriented for the week ahead. Today through the lens of the lectionary texts for today, Acts 11:1-18, and John 13:31-35, you are invited to reflect on how the Crucified Risen Lord's redemptive love breaks through boundaries of clan and tribe toward a more inclusive beloved family of God.

All children are welcome to stay in worship throughout the service but may leave after Scott offers a message for young disciples at the end of the welcome and announcements. Childcare is also provided in the nursery by Louna Esperance and Saturnina Greeves-Cooper from 8:45-11:30 am every Sunday. There are also curriculum bags for kids and a craft corner in the rear of the sanctuary if anyone gets restless. Church-wide events hosted by the YLC are inclusive of all ages! Continue to watch the FPCNC event schedule and sign up to explore faith and share in fellowship with our wonderful inter-generational church family.

FPCNC is staying steady with "mask optional" policy in worship, at church gatherings, and on church grounds. Fully vaccinated individuals are no longer required to wear masks, although those who prefer to may continue to do so. The in-person Sunday service will continue to be simultaneously streamed online via *LocalLive* at 10:00 am.

ABOUT TODAY'S MUSIC

Frederick Swann (born 1931) is one of the most famous organists of the last 50 years due to his many publications, recitals, church performances and his long run on the television program *The Hour of Power*. His career began when he was just 10 years old and he was asked to fill in for the organist at his father's church (Theodore Swann was a Methodist Minister in Virginia). Fred had been taking piano lessons and seemed at ease with the organ right from the start. His career included a long association with the Riverside Church in New York City, the Crystal Cathedral in Garden Grove, CA and the First Congregational Church of Los Angeles. While serving as Musical Director and Organist for the Crystal Cathedral (beginning in 1982) Fred appeared on *The Hour of Power* with televangelist Robert Schuller, which was broadcast around the world. Fred served as president of the American Guild of Organists and held several teaching positions including the University Organist and Artist Teacher of Organ at the University of Redlands in Southern California.

Our FPCNC Choir anthem, The Apple Tree, uses a Scottish folk tune that has been arranged many times for voice. Today, we hear a setting by **K. Lee Scott** (born 1950), one of America's foremost composers of music for the church. His hymns are found in eight hymnals including *A New Hymnal for Colleges and Schools* (Yale University Press), *Voices United* (The United Church of Canada) and *With One Voice* (Evangelical Lutheran Church in America). His 300 published compositions include anthems, hymns, works for solo voice, organ, brass, and major works including a Christmas cantata and Te Deum. Scott received two degrees in choral music from The University of Alabama School of Music and has served as adjunct faculty for The University of Alabama School of Music, The University of Alabama at Birmingham Department of Music and Samford University School of Music in Birmingham.


Our English Handbells ring an arrangement of a Scottish melody by **Kevin McChesney**. Kevin graduated from the University of Colorado at Boulder with a BMus in Composition and Theory. A composer and arranger of handbell music, Kevin currently has over 450 titles in print and is one of the very few musicians who makes handbells a full-time vocation. Kevin was a church music director in Methodist and Presbyterian churches for twelve years. Kevin is currently the Handbell Editor for Jeffers Handbell Supply and the RingingWord catalog. He directs an

auditioned community handbell choir, the Pikes Peak Ringers. He is also co-founder of the Solo To Ensemble Project, STEP, and authors a quarterly newsletter containing instruction and information for handbell programs, the Handbell Classroom.

TODAY at 4:00 pm, Charis Chamber Voices returns to our Sanctuary to present *Spring Canticles,* a program centered on classic choral works by Franz Schubert and Johannes Brahms. Charis Artistic Director Jeremy Wiggins, Assistant Professor of Music and Coordinator of Choral Activities at Western Connecticut State University, will conduct; our own Terence J. Flanagan will accompany on piano.

The concert celebrates the rejuvenation of the earth, the reincarnation of the spirit, and stories of deliverance. The program features an interlacing set of renaissance and contemporary pieces by Farmer, Pilkington, Mulholland, Hagenberg, and others, paired with the stunning setting of Brahms's *Schicksalslied* (Song of Destiny). Lastly, they will honor the Passover themes of strength, hope, and triumph, with music by Thompson and Stroope, ending with the dramatic retelling of the Israelites' exodus from Egypt in Schubert's *Mirjams Siegesgesang* (Miriam's Victory Song).

Soprano Joanna Mongiardo will be guest soloist in the Schubert. Ms. Mongiardo has been acclaimed for her opera and oratorio performances throughout the world. She brings a "voice of impressive size and warmth" to one of the composer's most brilliant and demanding soprano roles.



Charis is an auditioned chorus of 30 men and women from Westchester County, NY, and Fairfield County, CT. Founded in 1994, the group is renowned for its diverse repertoire, unique blend of voices and captivating performances.



Emergency response to Ukraine war




As the violence in Ukraine continues, the number of people being displaced internally and fleeing to neighboring countries increases by the day. And in the midst of the chaos, there are sibling churches and ecumenical partners who are already providing assistance with basic items for survival. Our first priority is to provide funding to these partners on the ground. While the scale of this crisis is new, receiving refugees from Ukraine and other countries in Central and Eastern Europe is not, which means we have trusted, established partners with the knowledge and expertise to carry out this important work. Our response will include both financial and technical assistance as the network of faith communities providing humanitarian assistance grows in the months ahead.
