We believe

- that God has revealed God's self as the one who wishes to bring about justice and true peace among people;
- that God, in a world full of injustice and enmity, is, in a special way, the God of the destitute, the poor and the wronged;
- that God frees the prisoner and restores sight to the blind;
- that God supports the downtrodden, protects the stranger, helps the orphans and widows and blocks the path of the ungodly;
- that, for God, pure and undefiled religion is to visit the orphans and the widows in their suffering;

TODAY IN WORSHIP

Welcome to worship on this, the 25th Sunday in Ordinary Time! We are glad you are with us and pray you will experience the grace of God in your life and in this community during our time together. Today we explore Jesus' perhaps most puzzling parable found in Luke 16:1-13, looking for what it might tell us about surprising ways to share the good news.

Belhar Confession The Belhar Confession was adopted by the Dutch Reformed Mission Church in 1986, during the time of apartheid and declared that apartheid constituted a status confession in which the truth of the gospel was at stake. Its confrontation of the sin of racism made possible reconciliation among Reformed churches in Southern Africa and aided the process of reconciliation within the nation of South Africa.

Sunday School is back and offered for children in Pre-K through Grade 7 during our Sunday worship service. Children leave after the Young Disciples message and are picked up in the Common Room after service. Our Sunday School program is a critical foundation for our children and youth. Children learn bible stories and engage in hands-on projects to develop and grow their faith. Older youth follow an age-appropriate curriculum in a format that encourages questions and discussion to develop their faith and to start to understand and wrestle with the complexities of spirituality and life. Our Sunday School is led by Holly Coughlin, FPCNC parent and experienced Youth Leader.

FPCNC also offers babysitting during our Sunday service provided by Louna Esperance and Saturnina Greeves-Cooper from Wee Care Nanny Agency. Our worship service nursery is located just off our Common Room vestibule down the long hall from the sanctuary and is available between the hours of 8:45–11:30am. Parental and guardian sign-in is required and we do ask that you pick up your child promptly after the service. Thank you.

Children are also welcome to stay in worship throughout the service and there are curriculum bags for kids and a craft corner in the rear of the sanctuary if anyone gets restless.

COVID 19 FPC Mask policy Masks are optional for in-person worship and other activities. ABOUT TODAY'S MUSIC

With our festive Rally Day celebration behind, I have taken today's prelude in a different direction, given the recent losses in our church family and recent 9/11 memorials. One of my favorite organ pieces was a tribute improvised by Pierre Cochereau in memory of Louis Vierne – *Berceuse*. Both Vierne and Cochereau served as head organist at Notre Dame in Paris, Vierne before Cochereau. **Pierre Cochereau** (1924-1984) studied at the Paris Conservatoire with Jean Gallon and Duruflé (harmony) and Dupré (organ). He was organist at St Roch, Paris, 1942-54, and in 1955 became organist of Notre Dame. His specialty was improvisation; the numerous recordings of his improvisations at Notre Dame show his mastery of the genres of the symphony, variations and the toccata. Today's prelude takes the "melody" of a sweet, gentil Berceuse composed by Vierne, and turns it into a wonderful tribute, becoming somewhat anguished mid-way, only to end in the most serene state – perhaps a musical depiction of Cochereau's grieving process...

Joseph Waddell Clokey (1890-1960) was an educator, organist and composer of sacred and secular music in the first half of the 20th Century. Clokey's father (also named Joseph Clokey) was a Presbyterian pastor, which was certainly an influence on the younger Clokey's focus on sacred music. Clokey was one of the most widely sung composers in churches during the 1950s. In 1987, composer John Ness Beck founded the John Ness Beck Foundation in memory of Clokey and Randall Thompson to promote traditional sacred choral music.

Harry Thacker Burleigh (born December 2, 1866; Erie, Pennsylvania, died September 12, 1949; Stamford, Connecticut) was a Baritone soloist, a composer and a noted arranger of African American spirituals. Burleigh studied under Antonín Dvořák at the National Conservatory of Music in New York City and through his singing acquainted Dvořák with traditional Black vocal music. He was a soloist in New York City at St. George's Church (1894-1946) and at Temple Emanuel (1900-1925). He composed more than 200 songs and became widely known for his arrangements like *Deep River*.

Michelle Leclerc (1939-2006) was among those artists who leave their mark on their time. She, via her recitals and recording catalog, did her part in reinstating the concert organ's claim to nobility. Her teachers initially included Jean Langlais, under whose guidance she received the Virtuosity Degree at the Schola Cantorum in Paris. She subsequently coached in the art of improvisation with Pierre Cochereau. At the end of her life, she was Titular Organist of the Cathedral in Sens, where she directed the International Organ Festival, and Co-Titular Organist of the Lutheran Church of les Billettes in Paris. As Professor at the National Conservatory of Orléans and at the Schola Cantorum in Paris, she was often called upon to teach various master classes and was invited to participate in the juries for international competitions.



Interim Sunday School Director – We're thrilled to welcome Holly Coughlin as interim Sunday School Director and youth group liaison. Holly has worked with high school and middle school youth for the last 20 years in churches, non-profit organizations and schools. Holly joined FPCNC in 2022 with her husband, Paul and children, Carolina (11) and Nolan (9). As an entrepreneur, Holly has founded and led multiple organizations across several industries. She's currently a Marketing Executive in the Pharmaceutical sector. Holly resides in Ridgefield with her amazing family and enjoys dancing, movies, Clemson football and running with her kids to and from baseball, softball, basketball, football, voice and acting. Holly is excited to take on this new role with the FPCNC to grow the children's and youth ministry to a state of vibrancy.


GROW IN FAITH



Europe is facing its largest humanitarian crisis since World War II. The United Nations estimates up to 18 million people, both internally displaced and refugees, will eventually be impacted.

According to reports from Action by Churches Together (ACT) Alliance, Ukrainians are facing reduced or disrupted services in water, heating, electricity, transportation and telecommunications. Health services have deteriorated rapidly due to shortages of medical supplies and personnel.

Refugees, mostly women, children, people with disabilities and the elderly, had to leave their homes and spend days traveling to neighboring countries for safety, with almost nothing with them.
