

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TODAY IN WORSHIP

Welcome to worship on this Fifth Sunday after Epiphany (the season of celebrating the increasing light in our world and our opportunity to reflect the light of Christ's love). We are glad you are with us and pray you will experience the grace of God's welcome during our time together and be spiritually refreshed and socially reoriented for the coming week. Today, we reflect on the two lectionary texts from the prophet Isaiah and Matthew, the gospel writer, to consider what it means to be "salt" and "light" in the world.

Sunday School is offered for children in Pre-K through Grade 7 during our Sunday worship service. Children leave after the Young Disciples message and parents can pick up their children in the Common Room after service. Our Sunday School program is a critical foundation for our children and youth. Children learn bible stories and engage in hands-on projects to develop and grow their faith. Older youth follow an age-appropriate curriculum in a format that encourages questions and discussion to develop their faith and to start to understand and wrestle with the complexities of spirituality and life. *Our Sunday School is led by Kristie Godina, FPCNC parent, experienced Teacher and Youth Leader.*

FPCNC also offers **babysitting during our Sunday service** provided by Saturnina Greeves-Cooper and Lizz Reyes from Wee Care Nanny Agency. Our worship service nursery is located just off our Common Room vestibule down the long hall from the sanctuary and is available between the hours of 8:45–11:30am. <u>Parental and guardian signing in is required and we do ask that you pick up your child promptly after the service.</u>

Children are also welcome to stay in worship throughout the service and there are curriculum bags for kids and a craft corner in the rear of the sanctuary if anyone gets restless.

ABOUT TODAY'S MUSIC

Marcel Jean-Jules Dupré (1886-1971) was a French organist, composer, and pedagogue. His father Aimable Albert Dupré was Titular Organist of Saint-Ouen Abbey and a friend of Aristide Cavaillé-Coll, who built an organ in the family house when Marcel was 10 years old. Having already taken lessons from Alexandre Guilmant, he entered the Paris Conservatoire, where he studied with Louis Diémer and Lazare Lévy (piano), Guilmant and Louis Vierne (organ), and Charles-Marie Widor (fugue and composition). Twelve years later, he was appointed professor of organ performance and improvisation at the Paris Conservatoire, a position he held until 1954. Succeeding Widor in 1934 as Titular Organist at St. Sulpice in Paris, Dupré retained this position for the rest of his life. In 1954, Dupré became director of the Paris Conservatoire; he held this post for only two years before the prevailing national laws forced him to retire at the age of 70.

Jane Marshall (1924-2019) was a composer of choral music, a hymnist, poet and teacher. A longtime member of the Meadows School of the Arts theory faculty and the Sacred Music graduate faculty at Perkins School of Theology at SMU, she taught in the summer continuing education program there and was active as a clinician for choral organizations around the country.

Jean Langlais was born on February 15, 1907, in La Fontenelle, Brittany, France and became blind from the age of two. Sent to the Paris National Institute for the Young Blind in 1918, he studied piano, violon, harmony and organ with great blind teachers among other Albert Mahaut and Andre Marchal. Later, he entered the Paris National Conservatory of Music in Marcel Dupré's organ class, obtaining a First Prize in 1930. In 1931, he received the *Grand Prix d'Execution et Improvisation des Amis de l'Orgue*, after having studied improvisation with Charles Tournemire. He ended his studies with a Composition Prize in Paul Dukas class at the Paris Conservatory in 1934. Professor for forty years at the National Institute for the Young Blind, he also taught at the Paris Schola Cantorum where, between 1961 and 1976, he influenced both French and foreign students. In 1945, he became the successor to Cesar Franck and Charles Tournemire at the organ tribune of Sainte-Clotilde in Paris. He left that position in 1987 at the age of 80, having been titular for 42 years. Jean Langlais died in Paris, on May 8, 1991, at the age of 84.

THIS WEEK AT FPCNC

Men's Gathering meets Wednesday morning at 7:00 am online this week! In preparation for Ash Wednesday and the Lenten season, we will explore some of the varying spiritual traditions and practices. Jesus said, "Out of the believer's heart shall flow rivers of living water" (John 7:38). As Richard Foster describes them, the major "streams" of Christian spiritual tradition are: The Contemplative tradition (or prayer-filled life); The Holiness tradition (or the virtuous life); The Charismatic Tradition (or the Spirit-filled life); The Social Justice Tradition (or the compassionate life); The Evangelical Tradition (or the Word-centered life); and the Incarnational Tradition (or the sacramental life). We will discuss, with adequate caffeination, these different streams and some of the practices to begin planning what will be life-giving practices for our Lenten journeys. All are welcome!

Weekly Bible Study is on Wednesdays. Our meetings in February will be from 12:45pm – 2:30pm and we will study the Gospel of Matthew. Men and Women of the congregation are welcome. Coffee and tea will be available. Come join us in the Parlor/Library. Sponsored by the Women's Fellowship.

LOOKING AHEAD

Adult Forum–Join us on Sunday, February 19 at 11:30am! Our next conversation on "Learning Continuously" (our third Mission Pillar), will be led by Dr. Eric D. Barreto, the Frederick and Margaret L. Weyerhaeuser Associate Professor of New Testament at Princeton Theological Seminary. He earned a BA in religion from Oklahoma Baptist University, an MDiv from Princeton Seminary, and a PhD in New Testament from Emory University. Prior to coming to Princeton Seminary, he served as associate professor of New Testament at Luther Seminary, and also taught as an adjunct professor at the Candler School of Theology and McAfee School of Theology. As a Baptist minister, Barreto has pursued scholarship for the sake of the church, and he regularly writes for and teaches in faith communities around the country. He has also been a leader in the Hispanic Theological Initiative Consortium, a national, ecumenical, and inter-constitutional consortium



comprised of some of the top seminaries, theological schools, and religion departments in the country. He is a member of the Society of Biblical Literature and the National Association of Baptist Professors of Religion. Please RSVP to the church office if you're planning to come.

Emergency response to Ukraine war



As the violence in Ukraine continues, the number of people being displaced internally and fleeing to neighboring countries increases by the day. And in the midst of the chaos, there are sibling churches and ecumenical partners who are already providing assistance with basic items for survival. Our first priority is to provide funding to these partners on the ground. While the scale of this crisis is new, receiving refugees from Ukraine and other countries in Central and Eastern Europe is not, which means we have trusted, established partners with the knowledge and expertise to carry out this important work. Our response will include both financial and technical assistance as the network of faith communities providing humanitarian assistance grows in the months ahead.
