



Second Lesson – Matthew 20:1-16

 1 "For the kingdom of heaven is like a landowner who went out early in the morning to hire laborers for his vineyard. ²After agreeing with the laborers for the usual daily wage, he sent them into his vineyard. 3When he went out about nine o'clock, he saw others standing idle in the marketplace; and he said to them, You also go into the vineyard, and I will pay you whatever is right.' So they went. 5When he went out again about noon and about three o'clock, he did the same. ⁶And about five o'clock he went out and found others standing around; and he said to them, 'Why are you standing here idle all day?' ⁷They said to him, 'Because no one has hired us.' He said to them, 'You also go into the vineyard.' 8When evening came, the owner of the vineyard said to his manager, 'Call the laborers and give them their pay, beginning with the last and then going to the first.' 9When those hired about five o'clock came, each of them received the usual daily wage. 10Now when the first came, they thought they would receive more; but each of them also received the usual daily wage. 11And when they received it, they grumbled against the landowner, 12saying, 'These last worked only one hour, and you have made them equal to us who have borne the burden of the day and the scorching heat.' 13 But he replied to one of them, 'Friend, I am doing you no wrong; did you not agree with me for the usual daily wage? ¹⁴Take what belongs to you and go; I choose to give to this last the same as I give to you. ¹⁵Am I not allowed to do what I choose with what belongs to me? Or are you envious because I am generous?' ¹⁶So the last will be first, and the first will be last."

TODAY IN WORSHIP

Welcome to Worship on this 25th Sunday of Ordinary Time! Today we are honored to welcome The Rev. Dr. Jonathan Walton, President of *Princeton Theological Seminary*, as our guest preacher. Please see his bio below and plan to stay for Dr. Walton's talk entitled, "Theological Education in the Contemporary Age: Expanding the Table". The Adult Forum will be held over lunch at 11:30am in the Common Room. We are glad you are with us today and pray you will experience the grace of God's welcome and be spiritually inspired and socially reoriented for the week ahead!

SUNDAY SCHOOL has begun! Sunday School is our weekly opportunity for children to learn about the love of God while building connections and relationships with other young folks as well as adults in our congregation. As is our tradition, Sunday School happens concurrently with our 10:00am Worship Service. Children begin the Service with their families in the Sanctuary and then are dismissed to Sunday School after the Blessing for our Young Disciples. If your child is planning on participating in Sunday School, we would love for you to fill out this brief form, so we know we have the most up-to-date contact info for you and a few important details about your child: https://fpcnc.breezechms.com/form/2023SundaySchool. Sunday School teachers are also needed. If you've got a heart for working with young people, please see the announcement on pg. 14 about how to get involved!

Children are also warmly welcome to stay in Worship! For children that stay during Worship, the *Pray-Ground* can be found in the area in front of the back pew. The Pray-Ground is a designated place in the Sanctuary where young children can experience Worship through age-appropriate worship materials and tools that will help keep them engaged in what is happening. We will continue to rotate books and coloring materials on an ongoing basis. Although it can seem counter-intuitive to adults, children are often able to process what they hear more effectively when they have something to do with their hands.

Any child worshipping in the Pray-Ground should bring their grown-up with them to the Pray-Ground. Including young children in Worship can sometimes feel a little daunting, especially on days when they're feeling a little extra fidgety, but we don't need to be discouraged from keeping children in the Sanctuary. There are many important things that children learn while in Worship, even when we're not sure if they're paying attention. Young children learn by observing the adults around them. Children acquire the "language" of worship by listening to and observing the words the adults around them say, much like how they learn their native tongue. Quite simply, children learn to worship by regularly being in Worship. So families with little ones should feel free to worship together in the Pray-Ground!

FPCNC also offers **babysitting during our Sunday Service** provided by Saturnina Greeves-Cooper and Lizz Reyes from Wee Care Nanny Agency. Our Nursery is located just off our Common Room vestibule down the long hall from the Sanctuary and is available between the hours of 8:45–11:30am. <u>Parental and guardian sign-in is required and we do ask that you pick up your child promptly after the Service.</u>

ABOUT TODAY'S MUSIC

This Sunday's organ prelude is the lively third movement from Symphony I (two different movements from this symphony were heard last Sunday) composed by **Louis Victor Jules Vierne** (1870-1937). As the organist of Notre-Dame de Paris from 1900 until his death, Louis focused on organ music, including six organ symphonies and a Messe Solennelle for choir and two organs. He toured Europe and the United States as a concert organist, and his students included Nadia Boulanger and Maurice Duruflé. He studied at the Paris Conservatoire with Cèsar Franck and then Charles-Marie Widor. Vierne became Widor's assistant in the organ class and as organist at Saint-Sulpice. He remained Assistant to Widor in the organ class, and also to his successor Alexandre Guilmant. Our postlude is the famous "Jig" (or Gigue) Fugue by **Johann Sebastian Bach** (1685-1750). It is a brisk, rhythmic, four-voice dance fugue and is technically brilliant, light-hearted and energetic with its frolic triple meter. Bach wrote this fugue, which stands alone not attached to a prelude, in his earlier years, presumably around 1705-1706.

Our FPCNC Choir sings a beautiful arrangement of the spiritual *Steal Away* by **John Barnard** (born 1948). John is a Fellow of the Royal College of Organists (FRCO), an Associate of the Royal School of Church Music (ARSCM) and an active developer of church music as a composer, arranger, choir director and organist in North West London, England. Barnard was on the Council of the Hymn Society of Great Britain and Ireland and has been active in helping to assemble such publications as Hymns for Today's Church, Carols for Today and Psalms for Today. He has been Director of Music at a series of high-profile churches, which include Emmanuel Church (Northwood), St Alban's Church (North Harrow), John Keble Church (Mill Hill) and St John the Evangelist Church (Stanmore). He returned to John Keble Church in September 2010, following the appointment of Canon Chris Chivers as Vicar.

Our offertory anthem is by another English composer and musician specializing in Anglican church music, **Geoffrey Turton Shaw** (1879-1943). After Cambridge, where he was an organ scholar, he became a schoolmaster, then a schools inspector, while producing a stream of compositions, arrangements, and published collections of music. He was awarded the Lambeth degree of Doctor of Music. Shaw worked with his brother Martin Shaw, also a composer, while his son Sebastian was a Shakespearean actor who is remembered for the Star Wars role of Anakin Skywalker.

TODAY

TODAY, we are joined by Jonathan Lee Walton, Ph.D., who is a social ethicist and religious educator known for engaging American evangelical traditions. On January 1, 2023, he became the 8th president of Princeton Theological Seminary. He is the author of two books, *A Lens of Love: Reading the Bible in Its World for Our World*, Westminster John Knox Press, and *Watch This! The Ethics and Aesthetics of Black Televangelism*, NYU Press. Prior to becoming president of Princeton Seminary, he served as the Plummer Professor of Christian Morals and Pusey Minister in the Memorial Church at Harvard University and as dean of the Divinity School at Wake Forest University. President Walton will be participating in our Worship Service and delivering the sermon along with presenting the Adult Forum discussing *Theological Education in the Contemporary Age: Expanding the Table* after Worship. *A light lunch will be included.*



Join us on <u>Sunday, October 1</u> for our next Adult Forum to hear Alan Teiger, Senior Trial Lawyer, Office of the Prosecutor, International Criminal Tribunal for the Former Yugoslavia who will be discussing *Pursuing Truth and Justice and giving Voice to the Voiceless* at 11:30am immediately following our Worship Service.

Alan Teiger began his career as a Prosecutor working for the U.S. Department of Justice in Washington DC in the Criminal Civil Rights Division which investigates racial violence, police brutality and the Ku Klux Klan including In the Rodney King case. Mr. Teiger prosecuted two of the four Los Angeles Police Department officers charged in the beating. In 1994, Mr. Teiger left the Department of Justice to serve as a trial attorney in the newly formed office of the Prosecutor of the International Criminal Tribunal for the former Yugoslavia (ICTY). There he had the distinction of having been involved in the tribunals' final trial of Ratko Mladic. In Mladic's genocide trial, the ex-Bosnian Serb general was accused of ordering the massacre of 8,000 Muslim men and boys at Srebrenica. Prosecutor Teiger demanded a life sentence for Mladic, saying a lesser sentence would be 'an insult to the victims, living and dead and an affront to justice to

impose a sentence other than the most severe available under law". Following the end of the ICTY, Mr. Teiger was chosen to join the recent Kosovo Tribunal as a Senior Prosecutor. Until last November, the position of Chief Prosecutor of the Kosovo Tribunal was held by American Jack Smith, the current Special Counsel in the investigation of the January 6 Insurrection. The Rev. Dr. Margaret Kibben is the Chaplain of the U.S. House of Representatives and Rear Admiral, U.S. Navy (Retired). On January 3, 2021, Chaplain Margaret Grun Kibben was sworn in as the 62nd Chaplain of the United States House of Representatives, having served as a Chaplain for over 30 years in the Navy and Marine Corps. Born and raised in Warrington, Pennsylvania, Chaplain Kibben graduated from Goucher College and received both her Master of Divinity and her Doctor of Ministry from Princeton Theological Seminary. Chaplain Kibben has served as a Fellow at the United States Institute of Peace and holds a master's degree in National Security and Strategic Studies from the Naval War College. In addition to Princeton Theological Seminary's Board of Trustees, Dr. Kibben serves on the boards for the Inamori International Center for Ethics and Excellence, the World War II Foundation, and the Marine Corps Scholarship Foundation. Dr. Kibben is a faculty associate for

Arizona State University's School of Politics and Global Studies. Margaret is married to Lieutenant Colonel Timothy J. Kibben, USMC (Retired). They reside in Alexandria, Virginia. Margaret enjoys cycling, swimming, gardening, cooking, and reading.

Woman 2 Woman

This fall marks the tenth anniversary of Woman 2 Woman, the prison ministry Nancy Gernert co-founded at Bedford Presbyterian Church in 2013. Woman 2 Woman is a prison ministry program that connects women in our community with women incarcerated at Bedford Hills and Taconic prisons and has connected more than 150 women in the community with these 2 facilities. These women are our neighbors, yet

many of them have little to no outside contact. Our visiting program is designed to provide much-needed emotional support, encouragement and friendship. Our goal is also to stretch our own capacity for empathy and understanding by developing a relationship of mutual respect and caring with someone whose history and circumstances is typically very different from our own.

What You Can Do

- Attend a 2-hour Zoom training session to discuss the program guidelines and to ask questions.
- Commit to visiting a woman in prison at least once a month.
- Determine whether you would like an experienced visitor to accompany you on your first visit.
- Attend visitor support groups, which are held three times a year. They provide a forum for sharing both the joys and frustrations of prison visiting and for discussing any questions or concerns you may have.


October is "Service Month"!
