



TODAY IN WORSHIP

Welcome to Worship on this 33rd Sunday of Ordinary Time, when we here at the FPCNC observe Stewardship Commitment or "Walk Forward" Sunday! Today we remember and give thanks for the saints who have touched our lives and, in their own particular ways, have shown the generous love of God in their generous giving which continues to be a blessing in our lives and life together. We will reflect on the importance of giving through the II Corinthians and Matthew texts and hope that you will be inspired to consider your pledge and giving as an important part of your faith journey. Either way, we are glad you are here and pray you will experience the grace of God's welcome and be spiritually renewed and socially reoriented for the week ahead.

Walk Forward Sunday – Not only is this a day on which we receive a lot of pledges but, for many of us who walk forward, it is also a moving expression of the congregation's coming together to pledge our support to each other, and to our Church, for the coming year. If you have already delivered your pledge to the Church, you are still encouraged to walk forward with one of the extra envelopes and pledge cards that are available as a symbol of your participation. The Choir will lead the walk forward procession. The pledge cards can also be used by any congregant who can't find the ones they received in the mail! Reflect on how you are investing in the "Beloved Community" with the abundance of blessings God has showered upon you. Thank you to the Stewardship Team.

SUNDAY SCHOOL is our weekly opportunity for children to learn about the love of God while building connections and relationships with other young folks as well as adults in our congregation. As is our tradition, Sunday School happens concurrently with our 10:00am Worship Service. Children begin the Service with their families in the Sanctuary and then are dismissed to Sunday School after the Blessing for our Young Disciples. If your child is planning on participating in Sunday School, we would love for you to fill out this brief form, so we know we have the most up-to-date contact info for you and a few important details about your child: https://fpcnc.breezechms.com/form/2023SundaySchool. Sunday School teachers are also needed. If you've got a heart for working with young people, please see the announcement on pg. 11 about how to get involved!

Children are also warmly welcome to stay in Worship! For children who stay during Worship, the *Pray-Ground* can be found in the area in front of the back pew. The Pray-Ground is a designated place in the Sanctuary where young children can experience Worship through age-appropriate worship materials and tools that will help keep them engaged in what is happening. We will continue to rotate books and coloring materials on an ongoing basis. Although it can seem counter-intuitive to adults, children are often able to process what they hear more effectively when they have something to do with their hands.

Any child worshipping in the Pray-Ground should bring their grown-up with them to the Pray-Ground. Including young children in Worship can sometimes feel a little daunting, especially on days when they're feeling a little extra fidgety, but we don't need to be discouraged from keeping children in the Sanctuary. There are many important things that children learn while in Worship, even when we're not sure if they're paying attention. Young children

learn by observing the adults around them. Children acquire the "language" of worship by listening to and observing the words the adults around them say, much like how they learn their native tongue. Quite simply, children learn to worship by regularly being in Worship. So families with little ones should feel free to worship together in the Pray-Ground!

FPCNC also offers **babysitting during our Sunday Service** provided by Saturnina Greeves-Cooper and Lizz Reyes from Wee Care Nanny Agency. Our Nursery is located just off our Common Room vestibule down the long hall from the Sanctuary and is available between the hours of 8:45–11:30am. **Parental and guardian sign-in is required and we do ask that you pick up your child promptly after the Service.**

ABOUT TODAY'S MUSIC

Today's organ music is composed by French organist, composer, and teacher **Charles-Marie Widor** (1844-1937). The son and grandson of organ builders, Widor began his studies under his father and at the age of 11 became Organist at the Secondary School of Lyon. After studies in organ and composition in Brussels, he returned to Lyon in 1860 to succeed his father as Organist at Saint-François, where he remained for a decade. In 1870 the post of Organist at Saint-Sulpice in Paris became vacant, and Widor was given the appointment for a year; he left it in 1934. He taught at the Conservatory in Paris, succeeding César Franck as professor of organ in 1890 and Théodore Dubois as professor of composition in 1896. Among Widor's students at the Paris Conservatory were many of the most distinguished European organists active around the turn of the century, including Louis Vierne and Marcel Dupré. Albert Schweitzer studied organ under him, and Arthur Honegger and Darius Milhaud studied composition. As a composer Widor is best remembered for his 10 symphonies for organ, although he also wrote two operas, a sizable body of ballet music, and various other vocal and orchestral works.

Today's first choir anthem is composed by **Joseph Waddell Clokey** (1890-1960), an American educator, organist and composer of sacred and secular music in the first half of the 20th century. A student of Edgar Stillman Kelley, he served as dean of the School of Fine Arts at his alma mater, Miami University, from 1939 until 1946, and had previously been Professor of Organ at Miami University (1916–1923) and Pomona College. His work included two symphonies, including the "Dorian" Symphony, two orchestral suites, a string quartet, a cello and violin sonata, twelve choral works in large form, five operas, organ suites, many organ pieces, and more than a hundred published choral works. Clokey's father (also named Joseph Clokey) was a Presbyterian pastor, and this was certainly an influence on the younger Joseph Clokey's focus on sacred music. He was one of the most widely sung composers in churches during the 1950s. His son, Art Clokey, was the creator of clay animation characters Gumby, Pokey and Davey and Goliath.

Our second choir anthem is composed by **Giuseppe Ottavio Pitoni** (1657-1743), an Italian organist and composer. He became one of the leading musicians in Rome during the late Baroque era, the first half of the 18th century. Giuseppe began vocal study with Pompeo Natali at the age of five and sang in the choir of San Giovanni dei Fiorentini from age eight. At Santi Apostoli he sang and studied counterpoint with Francesco Foggia, where his early compositions were performed. By age sixteen he was Maestro di Cappella at Santa Maria Maggiore, Monterotondo, a historic church near Rome. In 1673 as maestro for the cathedral at Assisi he began intensive study of the works of Palestrina, and in 1676 moved to the cathedral at Rieti. In 1677 he returned to Rome for a lifelong appointment as Maestro di Cappella at the Basilica of San Marco. In addition, he held a series of prestigious positions as maestro for Basilica dei Santi Apostoli, Rome (from 1686), at St. John Lateran (from 1708, where Palestrina had served from 1555 to 1560), and for the Cappella Giulia at St. Peter's (from 1719, immediately following Domenico Scarlatti), and Maestro di Cappella at the Collegium Germanicum in Rome.

SUNDAY SCHOOL

Because our Sunday School is growing, we need you to help our children grow in their faith and strengthen their connections to our church community. The form gives you a chance to indicate which age group you prefer working with if you have a preference, and how often you anticipate being able to volunteer. As we have a wide range of ages of children in our Sunday School, having more volunteers involved means we can create age/grade breakout groups that will allow for deeper conversation and meaningful relationship building. All resources for leading a Sunday School lesson are provided well in advance of the Sunday that you could be scheduled to lead, and I am here to facilitate and support all volunteers with whatever you need to have a rewarding experience helping our young disciples grow in their understanding and relationship to God. Sunday, December 31, 4:00pm New Year's Eve Festive "Go For Baroque" Concert and Party



Humanitarian response in Israel/Palestine

ACT: Urge the U.S. government to advocate for an immediate cease-fire and the end of the blockade on Gaza to ensure urgent access to humanitarian aid, and call for engaging a diplomatic solution to the conflict.

PRAY: Dear God, We come before you with heavy hearts, burdened by the ongoing conflict in the land of Israel and Palestine. As we listen to the stories, and see the news of what is unfolding, we pray for all the people affected by this strife, for the innocent civilians, the children, and the families who endure the pain of violence and unrest. In times of darkness, help us remember that we are all your children, and that love and compassion can transcend the divisions and hate that lead to war. Grant us the strength to work tirelessly for a world where conflicts are resolved through dialogue, justice and respect for one another.
