





TODAY IN WORSHIP

Welcome to Worship on this Third Sunday after Epiphany (January 6 was the Feast of the Epiphany)! We are glad that you are here and pray you will reflect on how God extends the call to you to follow through believing. We will continue in this season of Epiphany to explore what it means to follow Jesus and walk in His light through the lectionary texts for this Sunday in Jonah and Mark. We are glad that you are joining us for Worship and pray that you will hear "God's Word" to you and be spiritually refreshed and socially reoriented for the week ahead.

All children from Kindergarten age on up are welcome to join us for Sunday School this morning! Children depart the Worship service for Sunday School after the Blessing for Young Disciples. Sunday School is held upstairs in the "piano room" of the Bliss House (at the top of the stairs closest to the Pastor's Study). Adults can meet up with their children in the Common Room immediately following Worship. During the winter quarter, we will be learning about Jesus' life and ministry, the work of his Disciples, and how we can be disciples too!

Children are also warmly welcome to stay in Worship! For children who stay during Worship, the *Pray-Ground* can be found in the area in front of the back pew. The Pray-Ground is a designated place in the Sanctuary where young children can experience Worship through age-appropriate worship materials and tools that will help keep them engaged in what is happening. We will continue to rotate books and coloring materials on an ongoing basis. Although it can seem counter-intuitive to adults, children are often able to process what they hear more effectively when they have something to do with their hands.

Any child worshipping in the Pray-Ground should bring their grown-up with them to the Pray-Ground. Including young children in Worship can sometimes feel a little daunting, especially on days when they're feeling a little extra fidgety, but we don't need to be discouraged from keeping children in the Sanctuary. There are many important things that children learn while in Worship, even when we're not sure if they're paying attention. Young children learn by observing the adults around them. Children acquire the "language" of worship by listening to and observing the words the adults around them say, much like how they learn their native tongue. Quite simply, children learn to worship by regularly being in Worship. So families with little ones should feel free to worship together in the Pray-Ground!

FPCNC also offers **babysitting during our Sunday Service** provided by Saturnina Greeves-Cooper and Lizz Reyes from Wee Care Nanny Agency. Our Nursery is located just off our Common Room vestibule down the long hall from the Sanctuary and is available between the hours of 8:45–11:30am. **Parental and guardian sign-in is required and we do ask that you pick up your child promptly after the Service.**

If you wish to place flowers in the Sanctuary to celebrate an anniversary, baptism, or birthday, or to memorialize a beloved family member or friend, please contact the church office.

ABOUT TODAY'S MUSIC

Today's organ music is by **Charles-Marie-Jean-Albert Widor** (1844-1937). Widor's musical studies followed an unorthodox route. Rather than going to the Paris Conservatoire, he was encouraged by the organ builder Aristide Cavaillé-Coll (a family friend) to study privately in Brussels with Jacques-Nicolas Lemmens (whose French pupils already included Alexandre Guilmant) and François-Joseph Fétis. Back in Paris, Cavaillé-Coll promoted his protégé, introducing him to Liszt, Rossini and Saint-Saëns. Widor's playing as a young man was of such quality that he was invited to participate in the prestigious inaugurations of the organs at Notre-Dame and La Trinité, and in 1869 he became Saint-Saëns's Assistant at the Madeleine. In 1870, supported by recommendations from Gounod and Cavaillé-Coll, he was appointed Lefébure-Wély's successor as Titulaire of Saint-Sulpice, the post he was to hold for the next sixty-four years, and his earliest assistants included Fauré and Messager.

Our first choir anthem is composed by **Christopher Tye** (c.1505-before 1573), an English Renaissance composer and organist. Probably born in Cambridgeshire, he trained at the University of Cambridge and became the Master of the Choir at Ely Cathedral. He is noted as the music teacher of Edward VI of England and was held in high esteem for his choral music, as well as chamber works. It is likely that only a small percentage of his compositional output survives, often only as fragments; his *Acts of the Apostles* was the only work to be published in his lifetime. He ceased composing when he became a clergyman, returning to Ely Cathedral and later becoming Rector of Doddington, Cambridgeshire. Today, he is perhaps best known for the hymn *Winchester Old*, based on a theme from *Acts of the Apostles*, which forms the basis of the most commonly performed version in the United Kingdom of *While Shepherds Watched Their Flocks*.

Our offertory anthem is composed by **Martin Edward Fallas Shaw** (1875-1958), an English composer, conductor, and (in his early life) theatre producer. His over 300 published works include songs, hymns, carols, oratorios, several instrumental works, a congregational mass setting (the *Anglican Folk Mass*), and four operas including a ballad opera. Shaw was the eldest of nine children, son of the Bohemian and eccentric James Fallas Shaw, composer of church music and Organist of Hampstead Parish Church. He was the elder brother of the composer and influential educator Geoffrey Shaw and the actor Julius "Jules" Brinkley Shaw. He studied under Charles Villiers Stanford at


the Royal College of Music, together with a generation of composers that included Gustav Holst, Ralph Vaughan Williams, and John Ireland. He began his career as an organist, serving at Emmanuel Church, West Hampstead, from 1895 to 1903. He did much editorial and executive work in connection with popularizing music, the encouragement of community singing and raising standards of choral singing in small parish churches.





CARING FOR OUR NEIGHBORS

Humanitarian response in Israel/Palestine



We have witnessed the millions of people caught in the middle of the devastating conflict between the government of Israel and Hamas. This is a dire humanitarian crisis and the loss of human life is unimaginable. Through Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA), the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) is providing assistance to those most vulnerable, and supporting partners in Palestine and Israel who are responding to the needs of their neighbors. Our biggest concern is the safety and care for those caught in the middle of this conflict and in need of humanitarian aid, no matter their religious beliefs, politics or nationality. Years of recovery lie ahead. Will you stand in the "GAP" for all affected by this conflict? — Give. Act. Pray.
