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
TODAY IN WORSHIP

Welcome to Worship on this Fourth Sunday of Eastertide. Today we welcome to the pulpit The Rev. Dr. Mark Labberton PhD. who will help us to reflect on the relationship between fear and faith for daily living. Through the lens of the two texts from the Psalms and the famous story of Daniel, we will reflect on how God calls us to renounce idolatry and to trust God to be our very life and being. Through the story of Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego, we see what ordinary faith looks like in the face of extraordinary challenges. We are glad that you are joining us for Worship today and pray you will be spiritually refreshed and renewed, and socially reoriented for the week ahead.

TODAY IN WORSHIP (Cont'd)

Mark Labberton will also be be leading our Adult Forum at 11:30am where he will discuss: The Wisdom and Tyranny of Fear. We hope you can join us.

Mark, an ordained PC(USA) Pastor and President Emeritus of Fuller Theological Seminary, is a writer, preacher, and leader. He hails from Washington State, graduated from Whitman College (BA), Fuller Theological Seminary(MDiv), and Cambridge University (PhD). Most of his pastoral ministry was spent as the Senior Pastor of the First Presbyterian Church of Berkeley, CA. He has authored four books and many articles, and is currently writing another book on fear. He is married to Janet Labberton and they have two adult sons. Mark and Janet live in the San Francisco Bay Area.



Note from Worship Committee:

During our year dedicated to exploring the search for peace, notice the over 600 cranes that grace the wall to the east of the Chancel and at the back of the Sanctuary. The crane is a Japanese symbol of peace, here in origami form. These cranes were first strung above the center aisle of our Sanctuary five years ago in conjunction with the Confirmation Class of that year although they were folded on commission.

All children from Kindergarten age on up are welcome to join us for Sunday School each Sunday! Children depart the Worship Service for Sunday School after the Blessing for Young Disciples. Sunday School is held upstairs in our dedicated room on the 2nd floor of Bliss House (enter staircase next to the Pastor's Study, at top of stairs go straight and it's last door on your right). Adults can meet up with their children in the Common Room immediately following Worship.

Children are warmly welcome to stay in Worship! For children who stay during Worship, the *Pray-Ground* can be found in the area in front of the back pew. The Pray-Ground is a designated place in the Sanctuary where young children can experience Worship through age-appropriate worship materials and tools that will help keep them engaged in what is happening. We will continue to rotate books and coloring materials on an ongoing basis. Although it can seem counter-intuitive to adults, children are often able to process what they hear more effectively when they have something to do with their hands.

TODAY IN WORSHIP (Cont'd)

Any child worshipping in the Pray-Ground should bring their grown-up with them to the Pray-Ground. Including young children in Worship can sometimes feel a little daunting, especially on days when they're feeling a little extra fidgety, but we don't need to be discouraged from keeping children in the Sanctuary. There are many important things that children learn while in Worship, even when we're not sure if they're paying attention. Young children learn by observing the adults around them. Children acquire the "language" of worship by listening to and observing the words the adults around them say, much like how they learn their native tongue. Quite simply, children learn to worship by regularly being in Worship. So families with little ones should feel free to worship together in the Pray-Ground!

FPCNC also offers **babysitting during our Sunday Service** provided by Saturnina Greeves-Cooper and Lizz Reyes from Wee Care Nanny Agency. Our Nursery is located just off our Common Room vestibule down the long hall from the Sanctuary and is available between the hours of 8:45–11:30am. **Parental and guardian sign-in is required and we do ask that you pick up your child promptly after the Service.**

ABOUT TODAY'S MUSIC

This Sunday, our organ prelude is music by **Charles-Marie-Jean-Albert Widor** (1844-1937). On Easter Sunday, we heard the well-known Toccata from *Symphony V, Op. 42*. We will hear the beautiful and expressive *Adagio* that precedes the *Toccata* today. Widor was an organist, composer and teacher of the late Romantic era. As a composer he is known for his ten organ symphonies. As of 2022, he is the longest-serving Organist of Saint-Sulpice in Paris, a role he held for 63 years (January 1870 – 31 December 1933). He also was Organ Professor at the Paris Conservatory from 1890 to 1896 (following César Franck) and then he became Professor of Composition at the same institution, following Théodore Dubois. Widor was a prolific composer, writing music for organ, piano, voice

and ensembles. Apart from his ten organ symphonies, he also wrote three symphonies for orchestra and organ, several songs for piano and voice, four operas and a ballet. The French organ builder Aristide Cavaillé-Coll, reviver of the art of organ building, was a friend of the Widor family and had arranged for the talented young organist's study at the Brussels Conservatoire. It was in January 1870, with the combined lobbying of Cavaillé-Coll, Saint-Saëns, and Charles Gounod, the 25-year-old Widor was appointed as Provisional Organist of Saint-Sulpice in Paris, the most prominent position for a French organist. The organ at St-Sulpice was Cavaillé-Coll's masterwork and the instrument's spectacular capabilities proved an inspiration to Widor.

Our FPCNC Choir's anthem is also from the French tradition, composed by organist Jean François-Hyacinthe Langlais III (1907-1991), a composer of modern classical music and improviser. Langlais became blind due to glaucoma when he was only two years old and was sent to the Institut National des Jeunes Aveugles (National Institute for Blind Children) in Paris, where he began to study the organ, with André Marchal. From there he progressed to the Paris Conservatoire, obtaining prizes in organ and studying composition with Marcel Dupré and Paul Dukas. He also studied improvisation with Charles Tournemire. After graduating, Langlais returned to the National Institute for Blind Children to teach, and also taught at the Schola Cantorum in Paris from 1961 to 1976. It was as an organist that Langlais made his name, following in the footsteps of César Franck and Charles Tournemire as Organiste Titulaire at the Basilica of Sainte-Clotilde in Paris in 1945, a post in which he remained until 1988.

On Easter morning we hear *The Trumpet Shall Sound*, from **George Frideric Handel**'s (1965-1759) *Messiah*. This morning we will hear the opening solo of the third part of the *Messiah*, *I know that my Reedemeer Liveth*, sung by Lisa Flanagan. Handel was a German- British Baroque composer well known for his operas, oratorios, anthems, concerti grossi, and organ concertos. Handel received his training in Halle and worked as a composer in Hamburg and Italy before settling in London in 1712, where he spent the bulk of his career and became a naturalised British subject in 1727. He was strongly influenced both by the middle-German polyphonic choral tradition and by composers of the Italian Baroque. In turn, Handel's music forms one of the peaks of the high baroque style, bringing Italian opera to its highest development, creating the genres of English oratorio and organ concerto, and introducing a new style into English church music. He is consistently recognized as one of the greatest composers of his age. After his success with Messiah (1742), he never composed an Italian opera again. His orchestral Water Music and Music for the Royal Fireworks remain immensely popular. One of his four coronation anthems, Zadok the Priest, has been performed at every British coronation since 1727. Almost blind, he died in 1759, a respected and rich man, and was given a state funeral at Westminster Abbey.

Our organ postlude is an arrangement of **Johann Sebastian Bach**'s (1685-1750) *Now Thank We All Our God*, from *Cantata 79*. Bach composed the church cantata *Gott der Herr ist Sonn und Schild* (*God the Lord is sun and shield*), *BWV 79*, in Leipzig in 1725, his third year as Thomaskantor, for Reformation Day and led the first performance on 31 October 1725. The text was written by an unknown poet, who did not refer to the prescribed readings for the day. Bach began the libretto for the feast with a quotation from Psalm 84 and included two hymn stanzas, the first from Martin Rinckart's *Nun danket alle Gott*, associated with Reformation Day in Leipzig, as the third movement, and as the last movement the final stanza of Ludwig Helmbold's *Nun laßt uns Gott dem Herren*. Bach composed a work of "festive magnificence", structured in six movements. He scored the work for three vocal soloists, a fourpart choir, and a Baroque instrumental ensemble of two horns, timpani, two transverse flutes (added for a later performance), two oboes, strings and continuo. Bach performed the cantata again, probably in 1730.



Tech4Girls is a hands-on learning program which trains girls and women in digital skills, including ICT, coding and AI, in order to empower them with tech skills for career development. The initiative creates opportunities for African girls and women to immerse themselves in technology and



acquire skills needed for careers in science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM). Girls will also be taught soft skills including entrepreneurship, emotional intelligence and leadership.

The HACSA Foundation is an international non-profit founded by Ambassador Johanna Svanikier, a Ghanaian attorney and former ambassador to France, Portugal and UNESCO. - -Women Empowerment Women, New Canaan: \$2500 donation for an 8-week Skills Program began this spring for women struggling with family or personal challenges. 


Welcome Michele Bergeal!
