

<sup>26</sup>Then an angel of the Lord said to Philip, "Get up and go toward the south to the road that goes down from Jerusalem to Gaza." (This is a wilderness road.) <sup>27</sup>So he got up and went. Now there was an Ethiopian eunuch, a court official of the Candace, queen of the Ethiopians, in charge of her entire treasury. He had come to Jerusalem to worship <sup>28</sup> and was returning home; seated in his chariot, he was reading the prophet Isaiah. <sup>29</sup>Then the Spirit said to Philip, "Go over to this chariot and join it." 30So Philip ran up to it and heard him reading the prophet Isaiah. He asked, "Do you understand what you are reading?" <sup>31</sup>He replied, "How can I, unless someone guides me?" 



#### **TODAY IN WORSHIP**

**Welcome to Worship** on this Fifth Sunday of Eastertide. Today we will reflect on how Christ reminds us that our spiritual life, in order to remain healthy and fruitful, requires connectivity and welcome. Through the lens of the two lectionary texts from the book of Acts and the Gospel according to John, we will explore how connecting with Jesus connects us with the sometimes unlikely "other." We are glad that you are joining us for Worship today and pray that you will be spiritually refreshed and renewed, and socially reoriented for the week ahead.

#### **Note from Worship Committee:**

During our year dedicated to exploring the search for peace, notice the over 600 cranes that grace the wall to the east of the Chancel and at the back of the Sanctuary. The crane is a Japanese symbol of peace, here in origami form. These cranes were first strung above the center aisle of our Sanctuary five years ago in conjunction with the Confirmation Class of that year although they were folded on commission.

#### **TODAY IN WORSHIP** (Cont'd)

All children from Kindergarten age on up are welcome to join us for Sunday School each Sunday! Children depart the Worship Service for Sunday School after the Blessing for Young Disciples. Sunday School is held upstairs in our dedicated room on the 2<sup>nd</sup> floor of Bliss House (enter staircase next to the Pastor's Study, at top of stairs go straight and it's last door on your right). Adults can meet up with their children in the Common Room immediately following Worship.

Children are warmly welcome to stay in Worship! For children who stay during Worship, the *Pray-Ground* can be found in the area in front of the back pew. The Pray-Ground is a designated place in the Sanctuary where young children can experience Worship through age-appropriate worship materials and tools that will help keep them engaged in what is happening. We will continue to rotate books and coloring materials on an ongoing basis. Although it can seem counter-intuitive to adults, children are often able to process what they hear more effectively when they have something to do with their hands.

Any child worshipping in the Pray-Ground should bring their grown-up with them to the Pray-Ground. Including young children in Worship can sometimes feel a little daunting, especially on days when they're feeling a little extra fidgety, but we don't need to be discouraged from keeping children in the Sanctuary. There are many important things that children learn while in Worship, even when we're not sure if they're paying attention. Young children learn by observing the adults around them. Children acquire the "language" of worship by listening to and observing the words the adults around them say, much like how they learn their native tongue. Quite simply, children learn to worship by regularly being in Worship. So families with little ones should feel free to worship together in the Pray-Ground!

FPCNC also offers **babysitting during our Sunday Service** provided by Saturnina Greeves-Cooper and Lizz Reyes from Wee Care Nanny Agency. Our Nursery is located just off our Common Room vestibule down the long hall from the Sanctuary and is available between the hours of 8:45–11:30am. <u>Parental and guardian sign-in is required and we do ask that you pick up your child promptly after the Service.</u>

**Cents-ability.** We're now leaving the Cents-ability jar in the hallway on the way to the Common Room. If you have any spare change, please drop it into the jar either on the way to Coffee Hour or whenever you're in Church. You can also take home a small cents-ability bank to collect change. #### **ABOUT TODAY'S MUSIC**

This Sunday, we hear for our organ prelude and postlude, **Johann Sebastian Bach**'s *Praeludium et Fuga in f, BWV 534*. Though the sources do not support a clear attribution, and despite several unusual features, the 19th-century attribution of this piece to Johann Sebastian Bach was never seriously questioned until quite recently (in an article by David Humphreys in 1985). The now generally accepted rejection from his œuvre of course makes the question of authorship real. Though the known transmission can be traced back to a (lost) copy, once in the possession of Johann Christian Kittel (1732-1809), it is highly unlikely that he was the one who wrote BWV 534. The style of the piece and the nature of the transmission make an attribution to Bach's eldest son Wilhelm Friedemann (1710-1784) much more plausible. Though the work is unique in certain respects, several of its features point to the style of this composer, while the quality of the whole work may be seen to as an echo of the improvisations of the legendary organist.

Our FPCNC Choir's anthem is composed by German-born American pianist, composer, and music educator Jean Berger (1909-2002). He composed extensively for choral ensemble and solo voice. He studied musicology at the universities of Vienna and Heidelberg, where he received his Ph.D. in 1931 with Heinrich Besseler as his advisor. He also studied composition with Louis Aubert in Paris. He worked as the assistant conductor at an opera house in Mannheim. After the Nazi Party seized power in Germany in 1933, he moved to Paris, where he took the French name Jean Berger and toured widely as a pianist and accompanist. From 1939 to 1941, he was an assistant conductor at the Municipal Theater in Rio de Janeiro and on the faculty of the Brazilian Conservatory. In 1941, he moved to the United States. From 1946 to 1948, he worked as an arranger for CBS and NBC and toured as a concert accompanist. In 1948 Berger moved into the academic world, taking a faculty position at Middlebury College in Middlebury, Vermont, which he held until 1959. From 1959 to 1961, he was on the faculty of the University of Illinois at Urbana—Champaign. From 1961 to 1966, he taught at the University of Colorado at Boulder and then the Colorado Women's College in Denver from 1968 to 1971. From 1970 on, he lectured widely throughout the world on various aspects of American music.


Our alto soloist, Jamie Ratcliffe, will sing a solo from **Felix Mendelsshon**'s *Elijah* this morning. *Elijah* is an oratorio depicting events in the life of the Prophet Elijah as told in the books 1 *Kings and 2 Kings* of the *Old Testament*. It premiered on 26 August 1846 at Birmingham Town Hall in its English version, conducted by the composer. The piece was composed in the spirit of Mendelssohn's Baroque predecessors Bach and Handel, whose music he greatly admired, however, in its lyricism and use of orchestral and choral colour the style clearly reflects Mendelssohn's own skill as an early Romantic composer. Mendelssohn had discussed an oratorio based on Elijah in the late 1830s with his friend Karl Klingemann, which resulted in a partial text that Klingemann was unable to finish. Mendelssohn then turned to Julius Schubring, the librettist for his earlier oratorio *St. Paul*, who quickly abandoned Klingemann's work and produced his own text that combined the story of Elijah as told in the *Book of Kings* with psalms. In 1845, the Birmingham Festival commissioned an oratorio from Mendelssohn, who worked with Schubring to put the text in final form and in 1845 and 1846 composed his oratorio to the German and English texts in parallel, taking care to change musical phrases to suit the rhythms and stresses of the translation by William Bartholomew, a chemist who was also an experienced amateur poet and composer.


