



TODAY IN WORSHIP

Welcome to worship on this Fourteenth Sunday of Ordinary Time. Today we continue through the period of months called in some church calendar traditions "Ordinary Time." The gospel readings move chronologically through the gospel according to Luke, week after week, with only a couple of minor exceptions. We should also remember that "ordinary" doesn't mean average or so-so; rather, it comes from the Latin word "ordinal,"


meaning "related to a series." Ordinary Time is an ordered, deliberate, six-month step-by-step pilgrimage through the story of Jesus' life and teachings, this year with Luke as our guide. Today we will reflect through the lens of the gospel and epistle texts on the theme of peace, and how our witness to our faith in the world should bring healing and wholeness, "shalom" in the fullness of the Hebrew sense of the word. We are glad you are worshipping with us, and pray you will be spiritually refreshed and socially reoriented for the week ahead!

Sunday School will resume in September. Children are warmly welcome to stay in Worship! For children who stay during worship, the *Pray-Ground* can be found in the area in front of the back pew bench. The Pray-Ground is a designated place in the Sanctuary where young children can experience worship through age-appropriate worship materials and tools that will help keep them engaged in what is happening. We will continue to rotate books and coloring materials on an ongoing basis. Although it can seem counter-intuitive to adults, children are often able to process what they hear more effectively when they have something to do with their hands.

Any child worshipping in the Pray-Ground should bring their grown-up with them to the Pray-Ground. Including young children in worship can sometimes feel a little daunting, especially on days when they're feeling a little extra fidgety, but we don't need to be discouraged from keeping children in the Sanctuary. There are many important things that children learn while in worship, even when we're not sure if they're paying attention. Young children learn by observing the adults around them. Children acquire the "language" of worship by listening to and observing the words the adults around them say, much like how they learn their native tongue. Quite simply, children learn to worship by regularly being in Worship. So families with little ones should feel free to worship together in the Pray-Ground!

FPCNC also offers childcare during our Sunday Service provided by Saturnina Greaves and Lizz Reyes from Wee Care Nanny Agency. Our Nursery is located just off our Common Room vestibule down the long hall from the Sanctuary and is available between the hours of 8:45–11:30am. Starting Sunday, July 6 through Sunday, August 3, there will be NO access to the Nursery School building due to minor renovations. Please drop off your children with the Nannies in the Common Room for those Sundays. Parental and guardian sign-in is required and we do ask that you pick up your child promptly after the Service.

The Worship, Music and Fine Arts Committee sends greetings and heartfelt thanks to all of our church members who have stepped up to help and assist during Sunday morning worship services over the past few months. Serving as an usher, greeter, reader, communion preparer, communion server or cross bearer is an important role as it helps our church staff and enhances the worship experience for all. To those who have signed up to help over the past months, we thank you. As we move into the summer months, we ask you to prayerfully consider signing up to serve during June, July and August.



We can all be busy over the summer traveling and vacationing but our Sunday worship services continue on and could use your kind assistance when you are in town. Please consider logging into the Sign-Up Genius found on the homepage of the church website (www.fpcnc.org) to find a Sunday morning that works for you. ABOUT TODAY'S MUSIC

This Sunday, our prelude is music by French composer **Achille Claude Debussy** (1862-1918). He is sometimes seen as the first Impressionist composer, although he vigorously rejected the term. He was among the most influential composers of the late 19th and early 20th centuries. Debussy was admitted at the age of ten to France's leading music college, the Conservatoire de Paris. He originally studied the piano, but found his vocation in innovative composition, despite the disapproval of the Conservatoire's conservative professors. He took many years to develop his mature style and was nearly 40 when he achieved international fame in 1902 with the only opera he completed, Pelléas et Mélisande.

Henry Tate will sing our offertory solo, music composed by **Jakob Ludwig Felix Mendelssohn Bartholdy** (1809-1847), widely known as Felix Mendelssohn. He was a German composer, pianist, organist and conductor of the early Romantic period. Mendelssohn enjoyed early success in Germany, and revived interest in the music of Johann Sebastian Bach. After a long period of relative denigration due to changing musical tastes and antisemitism in the late 19th and early 20th centuries, his creative originality has been re-evaluated. He is now among the most popular composers of the Romantic era. We hear music from *Elijah*, *Op. 70, MWV A 25*, an oratorio depicting events in the life of the Prophet Elijah as told in the books 1 Kings and 2 Kings of the Old

Testament. The oratorio was first performed on 26 August 1846 at Birmingham Town Hall in its English version, conducted by the composer, and it was immediately acclaimed a classic of the genre. Notwithstanding the work's triumph, Mendelssohn revised his oratorio wholesale before another group of performances in London in April 1847. The German version was first performed on the composer's birthday, 3 February 1848, in Leipzig, a few months after Mendelssohn's death, under the baton of the composer Niels Gade.

Our postlude is composed by **Denes Agay** (1911-2007), a Hungarian-born American composer, educator, arranger and author. Agay was born and raised in a small village near Budapest and began playing piano at the age of three. In 1934 he completed his musical studies at the Franz Liszt Academy in Budapest. Agay was Jewish, and after the rise of Nazism, he emigrated to New York in 1939. 1942 he became an American citizen and joined the military, entertaining patients in the hospital wards in Tuscaloosa, Alabama. After the war Agay returned to music publishing, employed by companies including Music Sales Corp., Yorktown Music Press, and Consolidated Music Publishers. Today Agay is most remembered for more than 90 music books. Agay also continued to compose for the concert hall and for educational purposes. Late in their lives he and his wife endowed a Piano and Composition Scholarship Fund for the Peabody Conservatory in Baltimore, Maryland.

Work has begun on our historic Aeolian Skinner Organ...

The static regulator, also known as a bellows or reservoir, has been removed from our pipe organ to be releathered (see before and after photos below). This is a crucial component that ensures a consistent air pressure supply (from the blower) to the organ pipes, preventing pitch fluctuations due to varying airflow demands. It acts as a pressure buffer, maintaining a stable wind pressure regardless of how many pipes are being played simultaneously. The regulator typically consists of a bellows mechanism, often with a weighted top or spring-loaded system, that expands and contracts to compensate for changes in air pressure. When the blower is turned on, the regulator expands, and a valve closes to regulate the airflow into the bellows, thus stabilizing the



(Before Static Regulator Removal)


pressure. As more pipes are played, requiring more air, the regulator adjusts its volume to maintain a consistent pressure. Maintaining a constant air pressure is vital for the accurate pitch and tone of the organ pipes. Without a regulator, the pressure would fluctuate with the number of pipes being played, causing noticeable changes in pitch. The releathering will take a couple of weeks and the pipe organ will not be useable during this time. Any questions or if you are interested in learning more, please reach out to Terry.





(After Static Regulator Removal)

Do you notice anything different in our Sanctuary?

This past week, the front-most row of wooden pedal flute pipes on the right side of the organ façade were taken out, and the air chest they rested on was repositioned as far forward as possible to make room for the addition of the new pedal pipes expected to arrive soon. While these wooden pipes were out of the organ, the tuning stoppers were all repacked to ensure they will not slide down into the pipe causing it to go out of tune. Stain was then applied to each wood pipe to give a new appearance. The work area in the organ was cleaned and the pipes were reinstalled. The repositioning of these pipes has made the façade's presence appear more uniform overall in the Sanctuary with the "widening" of the narrowest part of the original design.


