Will you in your own life seek to follow the Lord Jesus Christ, love your neighbors, and work for the reconciliation of the world? I will.

Do you promise to further the peace, unity, and purity of the church? I do.

Will you pray for and seek to serve the people with energy, intelligence, imagination, and love? I will.

Will you be a faithful Ruling Elder, watching over the people, providing for their worship, nurture and service? Will you share in government and discipline, serving in councils of the church and in your ministry will you try to show the love and justice of Jesus Christ? I will.





#### **TODAY IN WORSHIP**

Welcome to worship on this 26<sup>th</sup> Sunday of Ordinary Time, and also during our worship we will ordain and install new leaders. Today's texts confront those of us who are rich in things and able to do more for the poor around us. The parable of Lazarus is challenging, especially for us who live in a very privileged community. The prophet Amos also warns us that God cares about economic justice, but even more importantly, about how indifference to the suffering of others will be judged. Both these lectionary texts compel us to consider again how we are being stewards of what we have, and to remember that injustice has consequences for us all. We pray that in our time of worship together you will be spiritually refreshed and socially reoriented for the week ahead!

**Sunday School!** Join us as we explore Bible stories and all our questions about God, Jesus, the Holy Spirit, and the world around us. We will explore these themes through discussion, crafts, music, and other visual media. Children begin worship in the Sanctuary with their families then following the Blessing for Young Disciples, we move to our Sunday School classes upstairs in the Bliss House and then return to the Sanctuary towards the end of worship.

Children are warmly welcome to stay in Worship! For children who stay during worship, the *Pray-Ground* can be found in the area in front of the back pew bench. The Pray-Ground is a designated place in the Sanctuary where young children can experience worship through age-appropriate worship materials and tools that will help keep them engaged in what is happening. We will continue to rotate books and coloring materials on an ongoing basis. Although it can seem counter-intuitive to adults, children are often able to process what they hear more effectively when they have something to do with their hands.

Any child worshipping in the Pray-Ground should bring their grown-up with them to the Pray-Ground. Including young children in worship can sometimes feel a little daunting, especially on days when they're feeling a little extra fidgety, but we don't need to be discouraged from keeping children in the Sanctuary. There are many important things that children learn while in worship, even when we're not sure if they're paying attention. Young children learn by observing the adults around them. Children acquire the "language" of worship by listening to and observing the words the adults around them say, much like how they learn their native tongue. Quite simply, children learn to worship by regularly being in Worship. So families with little ones should feel free to worship together in the Pray-Ground!

**FPCNC also offers childcare during our Sunday Service** provided by Saturnina Greaves and Lizz Reyes from Wee Care Nanny Agency. Our Nursery is located just off our Common Room vestibule down the long hall from the Sanctuary and is available between the hours of 8:45–11:30am. **Parental and guardian sign-in is required and we do ask that you pick up your child promptly after the Service.** 

Have a prayer request? We are called to pray without ceasing... In addition to receiving prayers during the Service with the microphone, our prayer box offers the opportunity to submit handwritten prayer requests at any time. The box is in the back of the church adjacent to the Sanctuary entrance. Any prayer requests will be brought into the Sanctuary for worship by the Ushers. These requests will be included in our Prayers of the People for that Sunday. You will have the option to exclude your prayer from the communal prayer if you prefer. #### **ABOUT TODAY'S MUSIC**

This Sunday, our prelude music is composed once again by **Johann Sebastian Bach** (1685-1750), a German composer and musician of the late Baroque period. He is known for his prolific output across a variety of instruments and forms. I am delighted to welcome Trevor Babb, who will play Bach's music on the guitar. We hear the opening movement form his *Prelude, Fugue, and Allegro in E-flat Major; BWV 998*, written for lute or harpsichord. The piece was written around 1735. The original manuscript with the title *Prelude pour la Luth. ò Cembal. par J.S. Bach* was sold at Christie's on July 13, 2016, for £2,518,500. The Prelude is similar to many in the Well-Tempered Clavier (the second book of which dates from around the same time as this work), in that it is composed of many arpeggios. Arranged for guitar, it is usually played in D Major with a Drop D tuning.

Our FPCNC Choir's anthem is music composed by **Christopher Tye** (c. 1505-before 1573), an English Renaissance composer and organist. Probably born in Cambridgeshire, he trained at the University of Cambridge and became the Master of the Choir at Ely Cathedral. He is noted as the music teacher of Edward VI and was held in high esteem for his choral music, as well as chamber works such as his 24 polyphonic *In nomines*. It is likely that only a small percentage of his compositional output survives, often only as fragments; his *Acts of the Apostles* was the only work to be published in his lifetime. He ceased composing when he was ordained, returning to Ely Cathedral and later becoming rector of Doddington, Cambridgeshire. Today, he is perhaps best known for the hymn *Winchester Old*, based on a theme from *Acts of the Apostles*, which forms the basis of the most commonly performed version in the United Kingdom of *While Shepherds Watched Their Flocks*.

#### ABOUT TODAY'S MUSIC (Cont'd)

For our offertory music, we hear our choir sing music composed by **Alf Houkom** (b. 1935), a Minnesota-born composer of Norwegian heritage. Around Christmas in 1984; while living in Iowa as a professor at Cornell College, Alf Houkom was sitting in his easy chair reading a book on old Scandinavian runes. Suddenly, this text of Gaelic origin "simply grabbed me," he says. "In my experience, Christianity has the capacity to be a closed-door faith. This text struck me with its openness, with the possibility for the Christ to come in any place." Not writing for any performance or commission in particular, he quickly wrote today's anthem in response, and "...the music just unfolded, purposefully simple." It is accompanied by guitar. Alf is a 1957 St. Olaf Alumni.

We close our Worship with music composed for the organ by **Calvert Shenk** (1940-2005). Although he missed the feast day of Saint Cecilia by one day (he was born on November 21), music was always a major fact in Calvert Shenk's life. He graduated from Northwestern University in 1962 with a Bachelor of Music degree, and went on to earn a Masters of Music in Organ and Church Music in 1963 from the same institution. He continued his studies with Theodore Marier (Gregorian chant), Gerre Hancock (improvisation) and Sir David Willcocks (choral conducting). Mr. Shenk worked full-time at various music positions, including St. Henry Parish in Chicago IL, Armed Forces School of Music at Norfolk VA, St. Philip Parish in Battle Creek MI, St. Catherine Parish in Milwaukee WI, Cathedral of Saint Paul in Birmingham AL, as Organist and Director of Music at the Sacred Heart Seminary in Detroit MI and his last position as Director of Music at Assumption Grotto Church in Detroit. He also worked as Adjunct Instructor at Kellogg Community College in Battle Creek, as Music Critic for the Battle Creek Enquirer and News, as Choral Director at St. Philip Catholic Central High School, and as Associate Director, Accompanist and Composer-in-Residence for the Battle Creek Boys Choir. His particular interests were Gregorian chant, sacred polyphony, organ performance and improvisation, liturgical ceremony, and the theology of liturgy.

#### ABOUT TODAY'S GUEST MUSICIAN

**Trevor Babb** is a classically trained guitarist and composer based in New Haven, CT. He performs on classical guitar, electric guitar and other plucked instruments. He holds degrees from the Eastman School of Music, Yale School of Music, and studied at the Haute École de Musique de Genève for a year under a Fulbright Award. He teaches in the music departments at Vassar College and Connecticut College and performs collaboratively throughout New England and beyond.

**Peace & Global Witness Offering** will be next **Sunday, October 5**. This offering enables the church to promote the Peace of Christ by addressing systems of conflict and injustice across the world. Through the Peace & Global Witness Offering, congregations are encouraged and equipped to find and address the anxiety and discord that is prevalent throughout this broken and sinful world.

Offering proceeds will be distributed according to the following formula from PCUSA:

- 25% retained by congregations to support peacemaking efforts in their local communities. (A local charity will be identified in the next coming weeks.)
- 25% retained by mid councils to support peacemaking efforts at the regional level.
- 50% supports peacemaking, reconciliation and global witness.




