

#### **TODAY IN WORSHIP**

Welcome to worship on this Rally Day! We are delighted that you are here and hope you experience the grace of God's welcome. This is technically the 23<sup>rd</sup> Sunday of Ordinary Time, the season (almost six months) in the church's calendar of remembering the teaching of Jesus and learning to order our lives accordingly. Today we will reflect on the cost of discipleship. What does it mean for us to give up everything to follow Jesus? How is that even possible? Through the lectionary texts from the Gospel according to Luke and the prophet Jeremiah, we will reflect on what it means to follow Jesus and live into the new life which he promises, and to be reshaped and reformed by God's love. We are glad that you are joining us for worship, and pray you'll be spiritually renewed and socially reoriented for this next week of your life journey.

Today in worship, we celebrate the Sacrament of Communion also known as the Eucharist, a commemoration of Jesus' last supper with his disciples. Our communion bread is gluten-free and the cup is grape juice so that all who wish to partake of the Sacrament may do so.

Sunday School will resume on September 14.

Children are warmly welcome to stay in Worship! For children who stay during worship, the *Pray-Ground* can be found in the area in front of the back pew bench. The Pray-Ground is a designated place in the Sanctuary where young children can experience worship through age-appropriate worship materials and tools that will help keep them engaged in what is happening. We will continue to rotate books and coloring materials on an ongoing basis. Although it can seem counter-intuitive to adults, children are often able to process what they hear more effectively when they have something to do with their hands.

Any child worshipping in the Pray-Ground should bring their grown-up with them to the Pray-Ground. Including young children in worship can sometimes feel a little daunting, especially on days when they're feeling a little extra fidgety, but we don't need to be discouraged from keeping children in the Sanctuary. There are many important things that children learn while in worship, even when we're not sure if they're paying attention. Young children learn by observing the adults around them. Children acquire the "language" of worship by listening to and observing the words the adults around them say, much like how they learn their native tongue. Quite simply, children learn to worship by regularly being in Worship. So families with little ones should feel free to worship together in the Pray-Ground!

**FPCNC** also offers childcare during our Sunday Service provided by Saturnina Greaves and Lizz Reyes from Wee Care Nanny Agency. Our Nursery is located just off our Common Room vestibule down the long hall from the Sanctuary and is available between the hours of 8:45–11:30am. **Parental and guardian sign-in is required and we do ask that you pick up your child promptly after the Service.** 

Have a prayer request? We are called to pray without ceasing... In addition to receiving prayers during the Service with the microphone, our prayer box offers the opportunity to submit handwritten prayer requests at any time. The box is in the back of the church adjacent to the Sanctuary entrance. Any prayer requests will be brought into the Sanctuary for worship by the Ushers. These requests will be included in our Prayers of the People for that Sunday. You will have the option to exclude your prayer from the communal prayer if you prefer. #### **ABOUT TODAY'S MUSIC**

This Sunday, our prelude is composed by **Johann Sebastian Bach** (1685-1750), a German composer and musician of the late Baroque period. He is known for his prolific output across a variety of instruments and forms. We hear his joyous *Pièce d'Orgue*, *BWV 572*. No autograph of *BWV 572* survives. The earliest extant manuscript copies of the piece originated in the 1710s (early version) and 1720s (revised version). The piece was most likely composed in the early years of Bach's tenure at Weimar (1708–1717). The revised version must have been completed at least half a year before Bach moved from Köthen to Leipzig in the spring of 1723. Most printed editions entitle it a Fantasia, but many recitalists refer to it in their programs as *Pièce d'Orgue*, its title in all the contemporary copies; but this is possibly misleading, as there is little French about the music itself except the use of ninths and sevenths in the style of de Grigny (in the middle alla breve section) and the possible allusion to French plein jeu music (by the choice of the key of G major). The work could more accurately be described as a toccata, since it shares in the tradition of sectional toccatas (as conveyed by Buxtehude) in which a central contrapuntal section is surrounded by a toccata-like framework.

We welcome our FPCNC Choir's return today and they offer music composed by **Sir John Milford Rutter** (b. 1945), an English composer, conductor, editor, arranger, and record producer, mainly of choral music. He was educated at Highgate School, where fellow pupils included John Tavener, Howard Shelley, Brian Chapple and Nicholas

#### ABOUT TODAY'S MUSIC (Cont'd)

Snowman. As a chorister there, Rutter took part in the first (1963) recording of Britten's *War Requiem* under the composer's baton. He then read music at Clare College, Cambridge, where he was a member of the choir. Whilst an undergraduate, he had his first compositions published. He served as Director of Music at Clare College from 1975 to 1979 and led the choir to international prominence. In 1981, Rutter founded his own choir, the Cambridge Singers, which he conducts, and with which he has made many recordings of sacred choral repertoire. He resides at Hemingford Abbots in Cambridgeshire and frequently conducts many choirs and orchestras around the world.

During Communion, we hear choral music composed by Samuel Sebastian Wesley (1810-1876), an English organist and composer. He is often referred to as S.S. Wesley to avoid confusion with his father Samuel Wesley. His middle name derived from his father's lifelong admiration for the music of Bach. After singing in the choir of the Chapel Royal as a boy, Samuel Sebastian embarked on a career as a musician and was appointed Organist at Hereford Cathedral in 1832. He moved to Exeter Cathedral three years later. He subsequently held appointments at Leeds Parish Church (now Leeds Minster) (from 1842), Winchester Cathedral (from 1849), Winchester College and Gloucester Cathedral (1865–1876). In 1839 he received both his Bachelor of Music degree and a Doctor of Music degree from Oxford. He became a Professor of Organ at the Royal Academy of Music in 1850. He died at his home in Gloucester on 19 April 1876 aged 65. There are memorial tablets to him in Exeter Cathedral and Winchester Cathedral, and his memorial at Gloucester Cathedral is in stained glass. His better-known anthems include Thou wilt keep him in perfect peace – heard this morning – and Wash me throughly. Several of his pieces for solo organ have enduring value and continue to be played in recitals now and then. Of his hymn tunes the best-known are Aurelia - with which we begin this morning's Worship - and Hereford. While at Winchester Cathedral Wesley was largely responsible for the Cathedral's acquisition in 1854 of the Father Willis Organ which had been shown at The Great Exhibition, in 1851. The success of the exhibition organ led directly to the award of the contract to Willis for a 100-stop organ for St George's Hall, Liverpool, built in 1855. Wesley was the consultant for this major and important project. Wesley, with Father Willis, can be credited with the invention of the concave and radiating organ pedalboard. Their joint conception has been largely adopted as an international standard for organs throughout the English-speaking world and those exported elsewhere.

We close our Worship with music composed for the organ by **Frederick Lewis Swann** (1931-2022), an American church and concert organist, choral conductor, composer, and president of the American Guild of Organists. His extensive discography includes both solo organ works and choral ensembles he has conducted. Swann began playing the organ for church services as a ten-year old at a Methodist church in Winchester, Virginia, where his father was pastor. He graduated from Northwestern University with a degree in music and later studied at the School of Sacred Music of Union Theological Seminary in New York City. One of the best-known organists of the 20th and early 21st century, Swann was the former Director of Music and Organist at New York City's Riverside Church and Organist Emeritus of the Crystal Cathedral and the First Congregational Church of Los Angeles. Playing the Crystal Cathedral organ on the weekly Hour of Power television program, he was seen by an estimated audience of twenty million viewers in 165 countries. Swann lived in Palm Desert, California, where he was Artist-in-residence at St. Margaret's Episcopal Church from 2001 until his death in 2022. He was also formerly University Organist and Organ Professor at the University of Redlands prior to his retirement in 2018.

#### MUSIC HAPPENINGS



#### Our historic Aeolian-Skinner Pipe Organ speaks again!

A week and a half ago two Austin Pipe Organ technicians and I spent approximately 6 hours bringing our pipe organ back to life. The process began with reinstalling the main air reservoir (this was new with the Goulding & Wood 2002 renovation) followed by the static reservoir which is attached on the right side of the air reservoir (this is original from Aeolian-Skinner in 1968). A flexible wind sleeve (this moves up and down as the reservoir expands and contracts) was installed on top of the reservoir connecting it to the ceiling where the air enters the instrument. The six tension springs surrounding the expanding portion of the reservoir were then reinstalled, and then, finally, the connections from the blower to the reservoir were reinstalled.

At this point the instrument was turned back on to check the wind pressure. This is very crucial as the pipes were meant to speak properly (both regulation-wise and tuning-wise) to a certain pressure. We were fortunate to have no change in this, essentially meaning the instrument was in perfect tuning and playing condition. Finally, the wooden flute pipes in the façade that were moved earlier this summer in preparation were reconnected to the windline and then retuned as the tuning stoppers were reconditioned when the pipes were moved.

I am grateful to Austin Organs for their time and help with this very important work and look forward to the completion of the whole pipe organ project in the near future.






