TODAY IN WORSHIP

Welcome to worship on this First Sunday after the Epiphany when we welcome the Rev. Dr. Greg Cootsona, PhD, as our guest preacher. Learning from Jesus's words in Mark 2:27 that "The Sabbath was made for humankind and not humankind for the Sabbath," we will reflect on how technology must serve genuine human flourishing rather than reduce us to optimized outputs. In an age of tireless AI and the relentless cult of productivity, the Sabbath becomes a prophetic practice that reorients us toward our true identity as beloved, embodied creatures made for relationship with God and neighbor. We are glad you are joining us for worship, and pray you'll be spiritually renewed and socially reoriented as we move through the season of Epiphany!

Sunday School! Join us as we explore Bible stories and all our questions about God, Jesus, the Holy Spirit, and the world around us. We will explore these themes through discussion, crafts, music, and other visual media. Children begin worship in the Sanctuary with their families then following the Blessing for Young Disciples, we move to our Sunday School classes upstairs in the Bliss House and then return to the Sanctuary towards the end of worship.

TODAY IN WORSHIP (Cont'd)

Children are warmly welcome to stay in Worship! For children who stay during worship, the **Pray-Ground** can be found in the area in front of the back pew bench. The Pray-Ground is a designated place in the Sanctuary where young children can experience worship through age-appropriate worship materials and tools that will help keep them engaged in what is happening. We will continue to rotate books and coloring materials on an ongoing basis. Although it can seem counter-intuitive to adults, children are often able to process what they hear more effectively when they have something to do with their hands.

Any child worshipping in the Pray-Ground should bring their grown-up with them to the Pray-Ground. Including young children in worship can sometimes feel a little daunting, especially on days when they're feeling a little extra fidgety, but we don't need to be discouraged from keeping children in the Sanctuary. There are many important things that children learn while in worship, even when we're not sure if they're paying attention. Young children learn by observing the adults around them. Children acquire the "language" of worship by listening to and observing the words the adults around them say, much like how they learn their native tongue. Quite simply, children learn to worship by regularly being in Worship. **So families with little ones should feel free to worship together in the Pray-Ground!**

FPCNC also offers childcare during our Sunday Service provided by Saturnina Greaves and Lizz Reyes from Wee Care Nanny Agency. Our Nursery is located just off our Common Room vestibule down the long hall from the Sanctuary and is available between the hours of 8:45–11:30am. **Parental and guardian sign-in is required and we do ask that you pick up your child promptly after the Service.**

Have a prayer request? Prayer Cards are located in the back of the church adjacent to the Sanctuary entrance. Before worship, please give the completed Prayer Card to either Scott, Mary or one of the Ushers. These requests will be included in our Prayers of the People for that Sunday. You will have the option to exclude your prayer from the communal prayer if you prefer. All prayers will be held and prayed over in confidence. ABOUT TODAY'S MUSIC

This Sunday's organ prelude is by **Daniel Rogers Pinkham Jr.** (1923-2006), an American composer, organist, and harpsichordist. Daniel studied organ performance and music theory at Phillips Academy with Carl F. Pfatteicher. At Harvard University, he studied with Walter Piston; Aaron Copland, Archibald T. Davison, and Arthur Tillman Merritt were also among his teachers. There he completed a bachelor's degree in 1942 and a master's in 1944. He also studied harpsichord with Putnam Aldrich and Wanda Landowska, and organ with E. Power Biggs. At Tanglewood, he studied composition with Samuel Barber and Arthur Honegger, and subsequently with Nadia Boulanger. Pinkham taught at the Boston Conservatory beginning in 1946, and at the New England Conservatory of Music from 1959 until his death in 2006; while there, he created and chaired the program on early music performance. He also taught at various times at Simmons University (1953–1954), Boston University (1953–1954), and Harvard University (1957–1958). For forty-two years (1958–2000), Pinkham was the Organist of King's Chapel in Boston, a position which gave him much exposure to and opportunity to write church-related music; the Sunday evening concert series he created there celebrated its 50th anniversary in 2007. He was also a frequent guest on the E. Power Biggs program on the CBS Radio Network.

Our FPCNC Choir sings music by **Thomas Attwood** (1765-1838), an English composer and organist. Attwood studied under Mozart and he was friendly with Felix Mendelssohn. The son of a musician in the royal band, Attwood was born in London, probably in Pimlico. At the age of nine he became a Chorister in the Chapel Royal, where he received training in music from James Nares and Edmund Ayrton. In 1783 he was sent to study abroad at the expense of the Prince of Wales (afterwards King George IV), who had been favourably impressed by his skill at the harpsichord. After two years in Naples, Attwood proceeded to Vienna, where he became a favourite pupil of Mozart. On his return to London in 1787 he held for a short time an appointment as one of the chamber musicians to the Prince of Wales. In 1796 he was chosen as the Organist of St Paul's Cathedral, and in the same year he was made Composer of the Chapel Royal. His court connection was further confirmed by his appointment as Musical Instructor to the Duchess of York, and afterwards to the Princess of Wales. In 1821 the King appointed him Organist to his private chapel at Brighton. Soon after the institution of the Royal Academy of Music in 1823, Attwood was chosen to be one of the professors.

Giuseppe Ottavio Pitoni (1657-1743), an Italian organist and composer. He became one of the leading musicians in Rome during the late Baroque era, the first half of the 18th century. Taken to Rome as an infant, he began vocal study with Pompeo Natali at the age of five and sang in the choir of San Giovanni dei Fiorentini from age eight. At Santi Apostoli he sang and studied counterpoint with Francesco Foggia, where his early compositions were performed. By age sixteen he was Maestro di Cappella at Santa Maria Maggiore, Monterotondo, a historic church near Rome. In 1673 as Maestro for the cathedral at Assisi he began intensive study of the works of Palestrina, and in 1676 moved to the cathedral at Rieti. In 1677 he returned to Rome for a lifelong appointment as Maestro di Cappella at the Basilica of San Marco. In addition he held a series of prestigious positions as Maestro for Basilica dei Santi Apostoli, Rome (from 1686), at St. John Lateran (from 1708, where Palestrina had served from 1555 to 1560), and for the Cappella Giulia at St. Peter's (from 1719, immediately following Domenico Scarlatti), and Maestro di Cappella at the Collegium Germanicum in Rome.

Our postlude music is composed by **Johann Sebastian Bach** (1685-1750). The most exceptional member of a wide-spread German family of musicians active from the late 16th through the early 19th centuries, Johann Sebastian Bach is a pivotal figure in the history of music. He drew together the achievements of his predecessors and led on to new musical perspectives that influenced later generations. His genius combined outstanding performing musicianship with supreme creative powers in which original imagination, technical mastery, and intellectual control were perfectly balanced. Many of his works—such as the *Well-Tempered Clavier* and other keyboard works, most of his organ music, the *Brandenburg Concertos*, the unaccompanied solos for violin and cello, the cantatas, Passions, and oratorios, the *Art of Fugue*, and the *Mass in B minor*—became exemplary samples of their kind and have preserved their influence and legacy through the present day.

DISCUSSING: AN AI MADE FOR US

An AI Made for Us is a faith-informed approach to AI that engages with theological seriousness—neither embracing techno-utopianism nor retreating into fear. It insists we ask not only what AI can do, but who we're becoming in an AI-saturated world.

It argues AI must be designed around embodied dignity and authentic community—strengthening what philosopher Albert Borgmann called "focal practices" like shared meals, Sabbath rest, and gathered worship—because technology exists to serve human flourishing, not the reverse. It also calls to adopt a posture of Christian hope: realistic about dangers, like algorithmic bias, a surveillance marketplace, and concentrated power, yet committed to directing AI toward justice, compassion, and the fullness of life God intends for us and all creation.

**DISCUSSING: MORAL COURAGE IN DARK TIMES: IDENTITY, VIOLENCE, AND THE WILL
TO SURVIVE**

In this talk, Dr. Georgette Bennett shares the extraordinary story at the heart of her new book, Half-Jew – Full Life, about her third cousin-in-law Gary "Pips" Phillips. Born in inter-war Berlin to an Aryan mother and a Jewish father, Pips could have been spared the worst of the Nazi war on Jews. But the very week that the Nuremberg laws were enacted, he chose to become a bar mitzvah.

This story meshes with Dr. Bennett's own story. A child of the Holocaust, born into a bombed-out apartment building in Budapest. Although her parents miraculously survived, they went through all the horrors of the Nazi machine. That background inspired the work to which she has devoted the last 33 years of her life: interreligious relations, human rights, and conflict resolution. Prior to that, she had a groundbreaking career as a sociologist/criminologist who always had an interest in the links between religion and violence.

Tax Considerations for Year-End Charitable Giving

Recent changes to the tax code have impacted the tax treatment of charitable deductions for certain higher income donors. The One Big Beautiful Bill Act (OBBB) passed in July 2025 placed certain limits on amounts that can be deducted on individual's tax returns starting in 2026. The changes, which include a change in the deductibility of amounts below a certain income level, and a reduction in the maximum tax rate that can be used by the charitable deduction, impacts charitable donations made in tax years 2026 and beyond. The changes may increase the attractiveness of accelerating charitable deductions into 2025. If the changes impact you, it may be worth considering making your 2026 pledge payments before 12/31/2025.

Additionally, the changes to the deductibility of charitable donations in 2026 and beyond may make the use of a donor-advised fund even more attractive, as donations made in 2025 can be used to make charitable contributions in future years. The use of a donor-advised fund is also an attractive tool for using appreciated stock as a source of funds to make charitable donations, as the appreciated value of donated shares can be donated without incurring capital gains taxes, making appreciated stock an excellent source of funds for charitable contributions now and in future years.

These tax strategies are not for everyone, and a discussion with your tax advisor is warranted if you believe these strategies may be attractive to you. The committee will seek to generate additional ideas for volunteering, refine and increase our total charitable donations, explore mission trip opportunities, and expand congregational involvement in Mission & Outreach. We have renewed our commitment to **New Covenant Center** to purchase, prepare and serve dinner six times in 2026 at their Stamford facility. The **Dove Program** is one of Mission's most popular and successful programs thanks to all of you who participated and your fantastic generosity. **We collected an amazing \$32,260 this year to support Person-to-Person, up from a very impressive \$23,320 last year!** Also, a big 'thank you' to Julie Fowler who so ably assumed leadership of this program this year from Janet Lanaway.

Mitten Tree – In the season of giving, we collected 21 pairs of mittens and gloves for children and adults. They've been brought to Person to Person (P2P) for that organization to distribute.

A new event this year benefiting the **Tiny Miracles Foundation** was organized by Kristie Godina. The event demonstrated our congregations' initiative (thanks again, Kristie) and our hands-on volunteering (thanks to all knot tyers). During this coffee hour event, we helped construct baby blankets for preemie isolettes.



This year's **Mission Month** was also great success, and we will plan on continuing this tradition in October '26. The four consecutive weekly donation drives in October provided 356 undergarments to The Undie Project, 365 pairs of socks to New Covenant Center, 1550 diapers (plus bottles of Similac and baby wipes) to The Diaper Bank of CT, and many shopping bags of toiletries and personal care products to Bridgeport Rescue Mission. We significantly expanded our donations year-over-year and hope to do so again in '26!


