TODAY IN WORSHIP

Welcome to worship on this Third Sunday after the Epiphany as we reflect on what it means to hear and respond to God's call. We will be exploring "the call" to each of us through the lens of the two lectionary texts from Isaiah and Matthew and how we respond to the good news of the Kingdom. We are glad you are joining us for worship via LiveControl, and pray you'll be spiritually renewed and socially reoriented as we move through the season of Epiphany!

Sunday School! Join us as we explore Bible stories and all our questions about God, Jesus, the Holy Spirit, and the world around us. We will explore these themes through discussion, crafts, music, and other visual media. Children begin worship in the Sanctuary with their families then following the Blessing for Young Disciples, we move to our Sunday School classes upstairs in the Bliss House and then return to the Sanctuary towards the end of worship.

Children are warmly welcome to stay in Worship! For children who stay during worship, the **Pray-Ground** can be found in the area in front of the back pew bench. The Pray-Ground is a designated place in the Sanctuary where young children can experience worship through age-appropriate worship materials and tools that will help keep them engaged in what is happening. We will continue to rotate books and coloring materials on an ongoing basis. Although it can seem counter-intuitive to adults, children are often able to process what they hear more effectively when they have something to do with their hands.

TODAY IN WORSHIP (Cont'd)

Any child worshipping in the Pray-Ground should bring their grown-up with them to the Pray-Ground. Including young children in worship can sometimes feel a little daunting, especially on days when they're feeling a little extra fidgety, but we don't need to be discouraged from keeping children in the Sanctuary. There are many important things that children learn while in worship, even when we're not sure if they're paying attention. Young children learn by observing the adults around them. Children acquire the "language" of worship by listening to and observing the words the adults around them say, much like how they learn their native tongue. Quite simply, children learn to worship by regularly being in Worship. **So families with little ones should feel free to worship together in the Pray-Ground!**

FPCNC also offers childcare during our Sunday Service provided by Saturnina Greaves and Lizz Reyes from Wee Care Nanny Agency. Our Nursery is located just off our Common Room vestibule down the long hall from the Sanctuary and is available between the hours of 8:45–11:30am. **Parental and guardian sign-in is required and we do ask that you pick up your child promptly after the Service.**

Have a prayer request? Prayer Cards are located in the back of the church adjacent to the Sanctuary entrance. Before worship, please give the completed Prayer Card to either Scott, Mary or one of the Ushers. These requests will be included in our Prayers of the People for that Sunday. You will have the option to exclude your prayer from the communal prayer if you prefer. All prayers will be held and prayed over in confidence. ABOUT TODAY'S MUSIC

Today's organ music is composed by **Johann Sebastian Bach** (1685-1750), a German composer and musician of the late Baroque period and a master of counterpoint. Bach has been known as one of the greatest composers of classical music. We hear two chorale settings from the *Orgelbüchlein (Little Organ Book)*, BWV 599–644, a set of 46 chorale preludes for organ. Bach's apparent plan was for a collection of 164 settings of chorale tunes sung during the Church year so that each part of the year was represented. However, only 46 of these were completed. The manuscript, which is now in the Staatsbibliothek, leaves a number of tunes as missing or "ghost" pieces. The *Orgelbüchlein* as Bach left it contains about 80 minutes of music which span the liturgical calendar. Each setting takes a Lutheran chorale, adds a motivic accompaniment, and quite freely explores form.

Our bass soloist, Devin Mitchell, sings music by **George Frideric Handel** (1685-1759), a German-British Baroque composer well-known for his operas, oratorios, anthems, concerti grossi, and organ concerti. We hear a solo from his *Messiah*, HWV 56, an English-language oratorio composed in 1741. The text was compiled from the *King James Bible* and the *Coverdale Psalter* by Charles Jennens. It was first performed in Dublin on 13 April 1742 and received its London premiere a year later. After an initially modest public reception, the oratorio gained in popularity, eventually becoming one of the best-known and most frequently performed choral works in Western music. Handel wrote *Messiah* for modest vocal and instrumental forces, with optional alternative settings for many of the individual numbers. The autograph manuscript of the oratorio is preserved in the British Library.

Our FPCNC Choir's offertory anthem is by **Edward Benjamin Britten** (1913-1976), an English composer, conductor, and pianist. He was a central figure of 20th-century British music, with a range of works including opera, other vocal music, orchestral and chamber pieces. He studied at the Royal College of Music in London and privately with the composer Frank Bridge. Britten first came to public attention with the a cappella choral work *A Boy Was Born* in 1934. With the premiere of *Peter Grimes* in 1945, he leapt to international fame. Over the next 28 years, he wrote 14 more operas, establishing himself as one of the leading 20th-century composers in the genre. In addition to large-scale operas for Sadler's Wells and Covent Garden, he wrote chamber operas for small forces, suitable for performance in venues of modest size. Britten's other works range from orchestral to choral, solo vocal, chamber and instrumental as well as film music. He took a great interest in writing music for children and amateur performers. Britten was a celebrated pianist and conductor, performing many of his own works in concert and on record.

**DISCUSSING: MORAL COURAGE IN DARK TIMES: IDENTITY, VIOLENCE, AND THE WILL
TO SURVIVE**

In this talk, Dr. Georgette Bennett shares the extraordinary story at the heart of her new book, Half-Jew – Full Life, about her third cousin-in-law Gary "Pips" Phillips. Born in inter-war Berlin to an Aryan mother and a Jewish father, Pips could have been spared the worst of the Nazi war on Jews. But the very week that the Nuremberg laws were enacted, he chose to become a bar mitzvah.

This story meshes with Dr. Bennett's own story. A child of the Holocaust, born into a bombed-out apartment building in Budapest. Although her parents miraculously survived, they went through all the horrors of the Nazi machine. That background inspired the work to which she has devoted the last 33 years of her life: interreligious relations, human rights, and conflict resolution. Prior to that, she had a groundbreaking career as a sociologist/criminologist who always had an interest in the links between religion and violence.


